ACT 499 OJJ Fiscal Year 2017 Annual Report of Youth Served

The Juvenile Justice Accountability and Cost Effectiveness Act of 2016 requires OJJ to produce and disseminate three reports/datasets. This report serves as the first annual report describing the population served by the Office of Juvenile Justice during the preceding fiscal year. It will serve as the baseline for future reports.

The data source for this report is the OJJ Juvenile Electronic Tracking System (JETS). It is a server based system that combines a front-end interface through Lotus Notes and a database backbone using DB2. The comprehensive system tracks many components of the care a youth receives under commitment with OJJ along with demographic and narrative information. For the purpose of this report, the legal status of the youth within the previous fiscal year (Fiscal Year 2017) is used as the basis for all counts. The fiscal year calculations in this report will not change unless current or historical JETS data is edited to reflect a correction in the electronic record.

The following are definitions of terms commonly used in this report.

Legal Status is defined as follows: the judicial disposition of the juvenile's case (custody, probation or parole); the case type (delinquent or FINS); and, in custody cases based upon a delinquency offense, the type of location to be used to serve the youth (secure or non-secure). In the case of multiple legal statuses (concurrent or overlapping), the legal status is based on the youths' most restrictive or deepest penetration in the system. An exception will be made and noted in reporting on the supervision data.

LEGAL STATUS	DESCRIPTION
Secure Custody	The most restrictive status. Most youth classified as secure custody will be housed in male state secure care facilities or the female facility at Ware. Other youth in the secure legal status can be found in detention, parish jails and other locations with respect to their pending status for placement. Delinquent adjudications only.
Non-Secure Custody	Less restrictive custody status, ordinarily out-of-home placement. Includes both delinquent and status offense (FINS) adjudications.
Probation	Typically as a direct judicial determination or achieved after leaving Non Secure Custody status. Ordinarily in-home placement. Include both delinquent and status offense (FINS) adjudications.
Parole	Typically achieved after leaving Custody Secure Delinquent status. Mostly in-home placement. Delinquent adjudications only.


Youth Served is defined as the number of clients who were committed to OJJ's care for at least one day during the FY. In other words, youth served reflects the volume of youth in each legal status category over the time period. Youth may be reflected multiple times if they leave OJJ's care but later return.

Youth Committed refers to youth assigned to OJJ for custody in residential or secure care following a court adjudication of delinquency or Families in Need of Services (FINS). For the purpose of this report, these data will be used to provide information on "admissions." Act 499 calls for disaggregation of admissions data by initial disposition or revocation. This function was added to JETS in July 2017, therefore is not included in this report.

Admissions to Custody

There were 330 admissions to custody in Fiscal Year 2017. Admissions were down 12% from the previous year.





FY17 Custody Admissions by Most Serious Offense of Adjudication



This method records each completed occurrence of days assigned to each legal status. Youth with concurrent statuses will be grouped in the most restrictive legal status.

Youth Supervision

Research shows that treating young people in the community is preferable to involvement in the deep end of the system. Community-based treatment is not only more cost effective; it is more successful in keeping young people from future involvement with the juvenile and criminal justice systems.

This premise drives the Office of Juvenile Justice (OJJ) continuum of care and the belief that young people should be served in the least restrictive means while assuring public safety.


Because youth are often admitted or serve in multiple legal statuses during a reporting period, admissions reporting for this population as recorded in JETS is not illustrative of the total population. For example, a youth that is committed to non secure care in July 2016 may have been stepped down to probation in February 2017 or a youth that is in secure care may have also been admitted to probation for an additional petition in the same reporting period. Normally, OJJ would only report the non secure or secure "admission" using the method of most restrictive legal status in the reporting period. The same most restrictive criteria would be used for youth served. For the purpose of this report, OJJ will use unduplicated youth served by the FY by the legal status with the greatest length of stay in the period to provide a more comprehensive picture of the youth served under Probation and Parole. The difference between these two populations is displayed in the table below.

It should also be mentioned that OJJ serves additional youth in the community under Informal Adjustment Agreements (IAA) and Deferred Dispositional Agreements (DDA). Research supports diversionary measures such as IAA and DDA as being the optimal choice to keeping youth from deeper penetration into the juvenile justice system. In FY17, OJJ served 932 youth either on IAA or DDA. Data on these youth are not reflected in the data included in the next two sections on Probation and Parole Youth Served. In addition, 5 local jurisdictions provide local probation services: Caddo, Jefferson, Rapides, East Baton Rouge and Calcasieu Parishes. Data from these local programs is not included.

Youth Served on Probation

There were 3,376 youth served on Probation by OJJ in FY17. This number includes youth adjudicated on both delinquent and status offenses.



Average Caseload of Probation and Parole Officers (PPO)

The OJJ operates 11 regional offices across the state that supervise youth in the community, as well as, those in custody. In addition, the Probation and Parole Officers (PPO) are responsible for regular contacts with youth located within non secure residential facilities in their respective regions. These PPOs serve 138 judges in 103 courts across the state.

Budget reductions in FY2016 called for an increase in the average caseload of PPOs from 1:28 to 1:40. This increase was to be achieved by reducing the number of PPOs as positions became vacant. This lead to fluctuations in the number of PPOs throughout the year resulting in the shifting of cases from one PPO to another making it impossible to calculate an average daily caseload within the JETS system. At this time, 109 PPOs are employed across the 11 regions. The chart below shows the average yearly caseload for FY2017 based on youth served in each level of care and the current number of PPOs.

Secure Expenditures

The following section presents the total budgets from each secure care facility. It should be noted that the Swanson Center for Youth in Monroe and the Swanson Center for Youth in Columbia share many resources including educational resources. Each campus contains a school for which many operating and maintenance expenses are unable to be disaggregated from expenses for the rest of the campus.

In addition to the budgets below, the OJJ maintains a contract with CCS to provide medical/mental health and dental services to youth in secure care. The total expenditures on these services in FY17 was \$6,764,756.
